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




# Safety hits the road

On September 24, London Police Service made an enormous donation to benefit students in Fanshawe's emergency management, paramedic, police foundations and emergency telecommunications programs, as well as the greater community: an incident command vehicle.

Originally a motorhome, the 1993 GMC Firan was completely refurbished into an emergency services vehicle for Fanshawe. It now includes 30 feet of desk space, two dispatch workstations, emergency lighting, a roof-mounted video camera, a siren and a public address system.

The vehicle is topped by a flashing green light. "That is a universal symbol of a command centre ... there will only be two such possible vehicles in the entire city of London and community that can legitimately flash that green light," said Howard Rundle, president of the college. "If you're ever out in the community and you see a flashing green light, you know that you're near a command vehicle. It could be London Police Service or Fanshawe College."

Chief of Police Brad Duncan and his team were impressed by all the work Fanshawe has put into the vehicle. "We came around the corner ... and were blown away. We knew what we presented to Fanshawe as a donation, and that doesn't look anything like what we sent here," he laughed. "It's incredible what (they) have done with the command centre, and it's refreshing to see that it's now being used for further purposes after we've used it for so many years."

London Police Services originally commissioned the motorhome in 1993. At the time, it cost \$200,000 to add electronic and communications gear to make it a fully functional mobile command centre.

"This vehicle has served us very, very well over the years," said Duncan. "It was regularly used at scenes of crime, community events

and for events where we had environmental issues or issues that affected a neighbourhood."

Rundle called the RV a tremendous gift. "Emergency preparedness and public safety education at Fanshawe are very important," he said. "Fanshawe College has had a longstanding relationship with London Police Service, and this gift to the college and our students is a strong demonstration of our shared commitment."

Students in the emergency services programs at Fanshawe have a unique opportunity to gain experience with the incident command vehicle, which is similar to vehicles used in municipal law enforcement and emergency medical services.

"It will be used for incident command training, radio communications training and remote computer access training," said Rundle. "During an emergency, however, the RV will be mobilized under the direction of our emergency response team, our emergency director and our emergency operations group."

Rundle remembered an emergency that took place on campus a few years earlier where the vehicle would have been very useful to have. A power digger inadvertently punctured a high-pressure gas line, located in the ground near an electrical conduit. The gas shot through the conduit and into the middle of the facility. The entire college - plus the 400 students living in residence - had to evacuate as quickly as possible. "London Police, London Fire Service was here, we all had to pitch in, not knowing what the other was recalled doing," Rundle. "Fortunately, nothing serious happened."

"My hope is that, by being prepared, we'll never have to use it again. The best way to prevent an emergency like that is to be completely prepared, and then it just doesn't happen," said Rundle. "If it does, though, we'll be much better prepared than we were the last time."

# Author in residence advises young writers

Canadian author Andre Alexis is the 2010 to 2011 James A. and Marjorie Spenceley/Canada Council for the Arts writer-in-residence for the University of Western Ontario's English department.

Alexis, who is a playwright, short story writer and novelist, is well-known for his first novel *Childhood*. It won the 1998 Amazon.ca/Books in Canada First Novel Award and was a co-winner of the Trillium Book Award in that same year. He is also host of CBC Radio's *Skylarking* and contributing editor to *This Magazine*.

As part of his residency at UWO, he holds office hours like a professor and serves as a sounding board for burgeoning young authors at UWO and Fanshawe College.

"As of now, I've been reading manuscripts, lecturing," said Alexis. He's also been involved in disciplines beyond English, including helping business students with their presentation skills.

He brings with him many years of experience to the position.

"All I am is someone who's done something for a long time. I've likely faced the situations you've been facing," he said.

One of his recommendations for young writers is to simply write often and listen to their peers.

"By writing lots and for a long time is how I got to be myself," he said. "I had people start out at the same time as me. Your contemporaries are your greatest resources. You see them struggle with the same things."

And while heeding the advice of

your fellow writers is always advised, there's still something to be said for a formal writing educa-

"Writing schools force you to write," he said.

Ultimately, those interested in writing should be focusing on self-awareness to develop their style.

"Get to where your writing reflects who and what you are," Alexis explained. "That's where the art resides, being aware of what you're doing."

He also advises that writers should be aware of any stylistic ticks they may have, as they might be detracting from the authenticity of their writing.

"If it's a habit, you should lose it to get to the essence of you," he said.

But there comes a time when writers move beyond criticisms and comments from peers and superiors, and establish their voice – ticks and all. Alexis used the example of playwright Tennessee

Williams whose prose was criticized as being florid – his "tick" – but it was the elaborate colour he added to this work that made it great.

Those who wish to have an audience with Alexis should come prepared, however. He warns he'll be most useful for those who have experience writing and, even better, are published.

"For me, I'm like driving a Cadillac (with) bells and whistles. If you don't know how to drive, you won't get much out of me," he explained. "It helps if you've done a lot of writing and want to go further, then we can talk more or less as equals.

"I'm about the life choice of being an artist."

# Double (DineSafe) rainbow all the way across the city What does this mean?

London's eateries have been awash in rainbows since August. These colourful signs not only look pretty, they're going to help you dine a little safer.

The signs appeared as part of a new by-law, referred to as DineSafe, by the Middlesex-London Health Unit. They indicate that an eatery – the term encompasses restaurants, take-out places and variety stores – has not yet been inspected and received its official rating.

DineSafe inspections began October 1. When an eatery has been inspected, it will receive a new sign to display in a prominent place. A green sign indicates that the eatery has complied with the Ontario Food Premises Regulations; a yellow sign indicates the eatery has significant non-compliance with the regulations; and a red sign indicates that a restaurant has been closed due to immediate health hazards to the public.

"The other component of the bylaw is that we have a mandatory food handlers' certification component," explained David White, manager of environmental health for the Middlesex-London Health Unit. He is responsible for the food safety program. "We felt ... it will reduce foodborne illness if we have trained staff." This part of the by-law is slated to become mandatory in October of 2011.

White said the by-law is also aiming to increase public safety and awareness.

Another way to keep informed

about the food inspections of your favourite eateries is to go to the DineSafe website (www.dinesafemiddlesexlondon.com). It lists the number of critical and non-critical infractions of every establishment that serves food to the public for the past two years. The Enforcement Activities page "lists the restaurants that have either had a closure or a ticket issued by the public health inspector in the last three months," explained White.

White said the Health Unit team is pleased with how the program is being implemented. "I really think this is going to improve the safety standard ... and help the public make an informed decision."

# Project mobilizes youth into activism

If you've got an idea to help your community, then the United Way has got a way for you to make it real.

The Youth in Action program gives people between 13 to 24 years old the chance to develop a plan that helps the community and provides the funds to get it going.

The project must fall under one of United Way's impact areas of poverty, mental health, beginnings and transitions and must focus on newcomers and youths.

The YIA program is all about finding solutions rather than spotting problems.

"We're good as a community at seeing what's wrong," said the United Way's community mobilizer, Jeff Preston. "We see poverty, we see it downtown, we know people are falling through the cracks. But we often feel helpless and often that's where people stop."

"This program provides them the opportunity ... to make a difference."

In addition, YIA also lets those involved learn project management and how to write a grant proposal, among the other details of starting

their own program.

YIA has been funding projects large and small for around eight to 10 years, said Preston. The projects can range from homework clubs, to starting a multicultural festival because racism was identified as a problem at one school. One girl noticed high schools never talked about mental health, so she organized the Dream Project. It was picked up by the Thames Valley District School Board and won a national Top 20 Under 20 award from Youth in Motion

So the options are limitless as to what can be done in terms of projects, as long as they focus on bettering the community.

"We believe in the phrase (that) we want to create a community where everyone matters and we can't do it alone, but united we can," said Preston.

Applications are up on http://uwlondon.on.ca. There are two rounds of applications. The first deadline is November 5 (for more winter-focused projects) and the second is March 4, 2011 (for summer projects). At least 50 per cent of the team has to fit into the age stipulations.

# Fix up, look sharp

The site was originally created by an Australian company, but now offers Canadian prices. So instead of looking in the closet and feeling uninspired, those with access to the site can pick through tons of styles that look the best on them.

To join, you sign up and pay the one-time fee, and order your port-folio. After answering some questions, you get style ideas unique to your body type.

Casson assures that the clothing is current and updated every two years.


"It's a great graduation gift," she said.


However, going online isn't the only way to learn how to look more put-together. Casson offers consultations as well.

# The Venus Project comes to London

Imagine a world without money, with a resource-based economy and technology created for positive purposes and not war. That's what social engineer, industrial designer and creator of The Venus Project, 94-year-old Jacques Fresco, has been doing since the stock market crash of 1929.

"It was a time people united because banks failed and ... people lost faith in political office," said Fresco, on the phone from Montreal. He and his associate Roxanne Meadows have been on a seven-month speaking tour, which makes its way to London on October 9 at the London City Music Hall.

The Venus Project centers around a new "social design (that's) not communism, socialism or anything that's gone before," said Meadows. There's a focus on using science and technology to the benefit of people and society and using machines to "free people, not to downsize them," said Fresco.

The society would also have a resource-based economy where "everything is available without bartering," added Meadows.

The absence of politics and money from this vision is for good reason, according to Fresco and Meadows.

"The government really does not care about people," said Meadows. "It cares about wealth, power."

And money serves as an "interference factor," she added. "It creates elitism and greed ... As long as money is in the equation, you can sell drugs, buy off politicians...'

Essentially The Venus Project advocates equal opportunity for all.

"With our economy today we can create abundance all around the world, good medical care for everyone.'

The project is based in Venus, Florida, on 21 and a half acres. Ten buildings house all of Meadows and Fresco's research on this new social design. They make models of what future cities would be like, host tours and have guests stay to learn more about their advocacy.

They have funded the entire project themselves. They did receive some donations from Peter Joseph's film Zeitgeist, The Movie, but that has since run out.

Zeitgeist is the activist portion of the project. The film marked the moment when these ideals were introduced globally, Meadows. "Then it just took off like crazy." The film, which featured different theories on the parties responsible for 9/11 among other topics, garnered a lot of support for The Venus Project.

Meadows chalked up the interest in the film to society's need for something new.

"People are starving for some real answers in a different direction," she said.

But none of what the two are working towards can be achieved without others' support.

"People have to know about this direction," Meadows. said "There's a lot of studying to understand it. They have to be able to talk to others about it."

There would also have to be an uprooting of the current system.

"A resource-based economy cannot be implemented in a monetary-based system," she added.

However, there is some resistance from individuals as most don't want to "rock the boat" and need their current paychecks.

"It takes them losing their jobs and losing their houses to say, 'There's got to be another way,' said Meadows.

Currently Meadows and Fresco are working on developing the first city, although Meadows couldn't disclose when it would be complet-

The idea would be to have access centres where citizens could get all the goods and services they would need. "When you have access to the necessities of life, (people) don't steal," said Fresco. They used the example of a camera centre where someone could sign out a camera if they wanted, and when they brought it back, could learn more about it. There would be no need to keep things, said Meadows. "Keeping things is a burden."

As the two tour 20 countries to present The Venus Project to different cities, they're out to educate the masses and, most importantly, find people to carry on the legacy Fresco created.

"Jacques and I have no money and no power and it's up to what people do," said Meadows. "It's up to a lot of people to understand it and carry it on or else it won't be

Fanshawe student, and member of the Zeitgeist Movement London chapter and Fanshawe club, Kevin Labonte is one of those individuals they're talking about.

He first became interested in The Venus Project after seeing the first Zeitgeist film, which initially made him skeptical. However, after watching the second film which offered solutions to societal problems, he joined the London group.

"When you got into the idea of sharing resources, it just kind of made sense," he said.

But he also looks at The Venus Project more practically in that while the futuristic buildings and images of a city underwater could happen, the ideals behind the project are equally important.

"The idea of The Venus Project doesn't have to come to fruition," he said, adding that if society lives less materialistically and evolves in that direction, that progress is as relevant as building elaborate

"It's a change in values. You have something (to) work towards and present something better than what's currently used," he said. "It's a slow value change."

# Skate gear for grown-ups

Think of Apocalypse as the brick-and-mortar version of a mullet – but instead of "business in the front, party in the back," it's more "fashion in the front, art in the back" and a party the whole way

Apocalypse is not your typical clothing store. For one thing, it s located on London's funky Talbot Street, also home to Commander Salamander, Frilly Lizard and From Mars. Apocalypse is a Mecca for grown-up skater kids who still want to make a fashion statement minus the baggy, ripped jeans.

"It's all brands that are relevant to the skate culture, but it's more grown up skate stuff. Ramsden is not only the owner of Apocalypse - he's the sole employee. "(It's) me, myself and I! Owner, operator, janitor," he laughed. He's also curator to the gallery in the back of the shop.

"It's not a stuffy gallery space, it's kind of a chill environment, different than all the other places you typically find art," he explained. The gallery always features local artists, many who participate in monthly Art Fusion meetings. "I'm almost booked 18 months out now. It's awesome."

In October, Fanshawe student Andrew Mitchell will be showing his art in the gallery. "The work shown in Apocalypse truly defies explanation, and needs to be seen to be believed, but is a reflection of the brightest side of our culture," said Scott Mitchell, the artist's management. "The same can be said of the store itself, and that is why Andrew's work is such a perfect fit for the space."

# 360° News: national and international briefs

#### NATIONAL NEWS



- A Superior Court judge has decriminalized prostitution in Ontario. Judge Susan Himel found that former laws meant to protect prostitutes actually put them in greater harm. This decision would give more protection to sex workers and treat them as regular business owners. However, the government is concerned about this decision and is considering an appeal.
- Canadian retailer Giant Tiger is in hot water over their back-toschool ads that marketed Playboybranded undergarments to juniors. The stores have since removed the merchandise from their shelves, but not before receiving an onslaught of criticism from customers
- Students are still without jobs, reported a recent Statistics Canada paper. The jobless rate for postsecondary students increased from six and a half per cent in 2007 to 2008, to nine per cent in the 2010 to 2011 academic year. However, the average wage remained the same as hourly pay increased from \$10.75 to \$11.80.

#### INTERNATIONAL NEWS

· Though a devastating earthquake tore Haiti apart nearly nine months ago, over a million Haitians still live on the streets. Part of the reason for this is that the country does not have the funds to begin rebuilding: the \$1.15 billion promised in March by the U.S. has still not arrived. Though the States have sent over \$1.1 billion on postquake relief, long-term funds are needed to begin reconstruction. The Associated Press pointed to bureaucracy, disorganization and lack of urgency as reasons why the money has yet to be sent. The U.S. isn't the only country that has yet to send funds: over 50 nations and organizations pledged a total of \$8.75 billion for reconstruction, but Haiti has only seen \$686 million thus far, reported the Associated Press.



- It took over 90 years, but Germany has finally repaid its debt from World War I. On October 3, the 20th anniversary of German reunification, a bond issued to repay the remaining debt of 70 million euro (\$94 millions US) matured. The Treaty of Versailles in 1919 was the peace settlement signed by Germany and the Allies, which put full financial responsibility on Germany for the war and the damage it caused.

# Foliage gives students a living lab

Did you know that Fanshawe's London campus gardens are cared for by students? This year, over 70 horticulture technician students will plant and prune the shrubs and flowers all around campus. And with more than 100,000 plants belonging to over 2,500 species, that's a big task!

What the horticulture students do, essentially, is create demonstration gardens, using the landscape of the entire campus to learn about the needs of different plants, and to show just what they're capable of. Some of the flora attracts butterflies, while some smells like tangy spices. Some – like the crocus that are just starting to show – flower in seasons opposite to most of their relatives (autumn vs. spring). Behind the M-H link, there are three Baldcypress trees native to southern Florida swamps.

Many of the plants are threatened or endangered. One tree – the Dawn Redwood, planted behind residence – was thought to be extinct because it was only found in fossils until 1942, when a living specimen was discovered in China; now our students care for one here in London. The world's most northerly Ben Franklin tree grows here too.

Horticulture technicians in training also build and maintain hardscapes (like brick patios, sidewalks, and retaining walls) and they also care for Fanshawe's col-

lection of indoor potted plants that you see in offices, halls, lounges, and cafeterias. Generally speaking, it's a win-win partnership: Fanshawe provides the materials and opportunity for hands-on learning, the students provide the labour, and everyone gets to see the beautiful blooms that decorate our lawns and sidewalks as a result.

While the students spend up to 80 per cent of their time (roughly 1,500 hours each year) getting their hands dirty outside of the classroom in the 100-acre "living lab" that is the Fanshawe campus. some of that work also takes place off-campus. At the A.M. (Mac) Cuddy gardens in Strathroy, which were donated to the college by the Cuddy family, the students maintain Ontario's largest Carolinian garden. Back at home, the students also spend time in the greenhouse, growing rare tree seedlings to be planted on the college grounds.

And don't forget about Fanshawe's first green roof, installed this summer by ... you guessed it: horticulture technician students (working here for their co-op). Located above D1063, where hundreds of sedum - a drought-resistant perennial ground cover - now occupy over 850 square feet of rooftop space, the green roof is one of only a handful of its kind in the city. Interested in seeing the new rooftop green space? You can get a look at it through the window glass in the second floor A-D link.

So, next time you walk past one of the gardens on campus, take a minute to appreciate the buds and blooms you see all around. You'll actually be admiring the projects some of our students work on as part of their education here at Fanshawe College ... and besides, it's always good to stop and smell the roses!

# What employers want – their views on resumes and cover letters

Job seekers need every advantage to compete in today's employment market. Often critical to a candidate's success is their resume and cover letter. In June 2007, a resume and cover letter questionnaire was sent to approximately 200 employers to ensure that the advice given to students and graduates is as current as possible. Employers were asked to respond to a variety of questions geared specifically to content and presentation of resumes and covering letters. Over 80 employer responses were received and they represent a broad range of business and indus-

The responses and comments are as follows:

#### Resumes

## Visual Appeal

Q1. What length?

Ninety per cent of employers prefer a two-page resume with only six per cent preferring one page.

Q2. What is the preferred method to receive resumes?

Eighty-three per cent responded that resumes are accepted by fax, while 96 per cent of employers currently accept resumes by email or online through their website.

#### Content

Q1. Follow a chronological for-

mat:

Ninety-two per cent prefer a reverse chronological format. List your most recent education and experience first to make your resume easier to read and follow. The most recent experience is the most relevant to employers.

Q2. Include career objectives? Seventy per cent of the respondents indicated a preference for career objectives in some manner. Often the career objective is the first thing an employer reads, so make sure it is relates to the position applied to and state what you can do for the employer not just what you want in a position with them.

iem. - O3-Include related courses?

Q3. Include related courses? Fifty-four per cent of employers like to see information listed which describes program content. This assists in establishing if you have the necessary background or specific skills for the position. And, as not all recruiters are familiar with the content of each program they will gain valuable insight into what you have studied. In particular, if you lack related work experience then listing your academic experience is key. Only list courses if you are applying for a position related to your field of study.

Q4. Should skills be included? Ninety-four per cent of employers responded in favour of candidates identifying skills on their resume. Overall, 95 per cent favoured job specific skills and 84 per cent transferable skills. Be sure to list the skills that are known to

be a requirement for the position you are applying to. List specific examples of where and how you acquired your skills. Remember, transferable skills are subjective or intangible so back them up in terms of work, school or volunteer experience. Don't just make a list stating your fine qualities - be more specific! Include a summary or highlights section on the top of your resume and provide the reader with a snapshot of your related job specific skills, education and achievements.

Q5. Include hobbies and interests?

Sixty-one per cent responded in favour of including hobbies and interests with many comments indicating the need to be brief. This often provides information not apparent from your work history and amplifies character traits such as initiative, team and leadership skills. Career-related hobbies, volunteer positions and professional memberships seem to be of most interest to employers.

Q6. References?

Only 31 per cent of employers prefer to see references listed on the resume, 24 per cent said it doesn't matter and 45 per cent advised not to include them. Fewer and fewer employers are checking references prior to the interview. Generally, references are pursued only if a candidate shows promise during the interview and if the employer is considering an offer of employment.

Fifty per cent of these employers

still expect to see a statement indicating references available upon request. This shows a courtesy on behalf of the applicant and lets the reader know that references will be provided willingly. If you are invited to an interview you are expected to provide complete reference information (names and current phone numbers) and to advise your references that they will be con-

# tacted. General comments or resumes:

Quite clearly, employers want job seekers to itemize their relevant skills and abilities, and to target their resumes and cover letters specifically to each job applied for. You should use words and phrases associated to the position you are applying for as it makes the task of matching you to the position easier. Remember, your resume should be neat, clear, concise and easy to read in 30 seconds. Don't forget the importance of correct spelling, grammar and punctuation as both your resume and cover letter are examples of your written communication skills.

#### Cover letters

Q1. Is a cover letter important in the application process?

Eighty-seven per cent of employers responded in favour of candidates including a cover letter. This is an opportunity to provide additional information on why you are right for the position. It may be the one chance to sell yourself!

Q2. What do you look for in a cover letter?

Ninety-nine per cent of employers look for correct spelling and grammar, 86 per cent want to read how your qualifications match the position applied for, while 77 per cent are interested in the format and layout, only 44 per cent are looking for originality in how the letter is written. A good cover letter should demonstrate your professionalism and provide insight into your language and writing skills.

# General comments on cover

Cover letters should be one page in length and clearly identify what position you are seeking. Employers are looking for candidates who give a little extra effort so personally address your cover letter and explain how your skills and experience meet the requirements of the position.

# The medieval knight in modern times

The medieval knight's suit of armour was extremely expensive to produce. This armour was also a status symbol. The better the quality of the knight's suit of armour, the more important the knight. Submit a letter of complaint to the Ministry of Consumer Services – they have broad powers to inquire about your situation and can make an order directing a person to comply with the Act if it is reasonable to believe that they have broken the rules of the Act.

For a little over a year now, a volunteer-run support centre for sex workers, allies, and women in crisis has been active in London's Old East Village. Its name is SafeSpace, and it uses a model of empowerment to help sex workers operate with safety and dignity by offering harm reduction supplies such as STI educational resources, hygienic goods, food, clothing and information about available services in London.

Beyond simply providing resources for sex workers, SafeSpace has also focused on doing outreach to the community to de-stigmatize the issue, educating the public, and promoting the decriminalization of sex work.

Given its admirable efforts and principled position, it is no surprise that SafeSpace volunteers were among those who celebrated a recent ruling by an Ontario Superior Court judge that struck down laws meant to curtail the sex trade on constitutional grounds, in that they violated charter rights of freedom of expression and security of the person.

The ruling doesn't take effect for 30 days, and the federal minister of justice is considering appealing the ruling, which would allow those in the sex trade to communicate freely with customers on the street, conduct business in their homes or brothels, and hire bodyguards and accountants without risking criminal charges of "living off the avails of prostitution.'

The criminalization of sex work creates a far more dangerous work environment, resulting in many sex workers being raped, robbed, assaulted and even murdered. It is a model that empowers pimps and sex traffickers rather than the workers, and it can lead to far more coercive working conditions.

Although this ruling comes too late for the hundreds of sex workers who've been murdered and gone missing across Canada, it is finally a step in the right direction.

Have you ever signed up for a gym, modeling lessons, or dance classes? Lots of people get great deals by pre-paying up front, but when they want to cancel their memberships, they get hit with a refusal and not a lot of

Luckily, the Consumer Protection Act 2002 offers some protection for consumers facing problems with companies that offer services like gyms, martial arts, sport and dance classes, employment schemes and even dating services. The Act does not apply to non-profit or government organizations, private clubs operated by their members, or golf clubs.

Watch out for pressure tactics when signing up for any pre-paid service. You want to make sure you are getting quality for your money, so if a gym has poor equipment and facilities, it is probably not the place you want to be. When signing up with modeling agencies, make sure you know that you are dealing with a reputable company – those advertising in the classifieds probably are not the best in the industry. You should check out the Acting and Modeling Information Service (www.amisontario.com) before signing up with an agency or agent. AMIS is a watchdog for the industry, with lots of information about common scams and ethical agent behaviour.

With every pre-paid agreement for services covered by the Act, for payments over \$50 there is a 10-day cooling-off period where you can cancel at any time, for whatever reason, with no penalties. This time period starts when you receive a copy of the contract or when all the services under the contract are available to you, whichever is later. So test out the goods you will be getting under the agreement and see if the contract is worth it for you. If you would like to cancel within the 10-day period, it is best to cancel in writing. If you do not receive an actual copy of the agreement, you have one year to write a letter saying you want

Also, initiation fees cannot be more than twice the annual membership fees, and you do not have to pay more than once.

longer than one year, and a club must give you the option of paying in monthly installments. This protects consumers from paying a massive lump sum to a company that might go bankrupt. However, keep in mind that a service provider can charge up to 25 per cent more if you choose to make monthly payments

What if you cancel and they refuse to refund your money? The first step is to contact the business directly with a written complaint. Be sure to keep proof of the delivery of your complaint. This is important because the Ontario Ministry of Consumer Services wants to see that you tried on your own before helping you.

# Helpful social media - Read It Later

Read Ιt (readitlaterlist.com) is the latest mobile bookmarking service to surface for Internet users that have a lot to read, but not a lot of time.

Launched in 2010 by Nate Weiner, Read It Later is a tool that collects your links in a simple, clean space for review at any time. It has a to-do style interface that can be used through its website by way of plug-ins for your preferred web browser, or by a mobile app available on every smartphone platform.

When you come across a website, article or curiosity on your computer or on your mobile phone, you simply choose to save it to your Read It Later account to view later. Additionally, you can sync your reading list automatically between your computer and your mobile device, and choose to read your articles even when you don't have Internet access.

#### How it works

Read It Later records all of the relevant information about the article or website that you're reading (including the exact position of the page when you last looked at it) and stores them in a master list.

Access has been built in to many Twitter and newsreader apps, so you likely already have access to it - check your favourite social or browsing apps, it may already be there.

#### Why it's useful (or not)

Read It Later simplifies the process of gathering articles online and features them in the style of a to-do list - when you're finished with the article, check it off as read and it will be filed in the "read" portion of the application.

Browser plug-ins and mobile apps make it easy to incorporate into daily use. There is also a paid version of the service called Read It Later Digest that takes the random links you've saved and automatically sorts them into categories based on meta data that it finds on the link addresses themselves.

That said, you can manually edit each category with a series of keywords you'd like to use. Suppose you want your "music" category to include news and downloads. You can manually add the words "free," "download," "mp3" and more to ensure that any links with those words come up in that list.

Read It Later is a great way to save those articles and websites featuring relevant information to your studies, and all with the click of a single button in your browser or on your phone.

# Location-based craze: is it safe?

Location-based social networking is nothing new by technology's standards. Loopd, founded in 2005, was one of the first of such services available, while Gowalla (2007) and Foursquare (2009) have excelled and brought popularity to the technology.

With more than a dozen alternatives available, almost any smartphone equipped with GPS can be used to let a service know where you're hanging out, and give you the ability to check-in to venues and leave tips, pictures, or other information for future visitors.

With the recent addition of Facebook Places, Facebook's halfbillion users may prove to be just what the market needs in order to make checking-in as common as checking your texts.

But where does this information go? While it varies by service, information about your location is typically made available on a webpage dedicated to the venue (checkins at a particular location), your profile (a list of your check-ins), and any additional services to which you choose to link – usually Facebook and Twitter. Within seconds, your whereabouts are listed in up to four locations, and sometimes more if you choose to share with additional applications. That's four ways for someone to find out where you go and exactly when you're there.



Broadcasting to the world where you are may not be the smartest thing.

Do these safety concerns mean that users should avoid the service altogether? Not necessarily. Location-based networking can prove useful for tracking your time, saving money, and more. However, users need to remember that the purpose of these applications is to publicize your agenda. Anyone with an Internet connection can find out where you've been and where you are within minutes of your arrival.

To avoid these security concerns and retain the benefits of the application, users may want to consider checking-in at departure rather than arrival. By the time someone sees you've checked-in to Timmies for your morning cappuccino, you're already on the road to work, and when a pesky acquaintance arrives to dinner uninvited, they're met by your dishes.

Users should also consider being selective as to when and where they check-in. Checking-in while travelling or running errands alone may pose a threat to personal safety when unwanted visitors realize Twitter provides a real-time broadcast of your every move. Even your social life can be protected - telling someone you're visiting grandma while you're actually downtown with classmates can be a quick way to end a friendship, and something that can be avoided by selective check-ins.

Avoid checking-in to venues which hint at extended absence from your home, such as hotels or hospitals. If a person wants a thorough list of people whose homes are currently unattended, they need only to check the list of people recently arriving at a nearby hotel. This opens a whole new door for a variety of organized crimes.

Letting the world know where you live by setting a "home" venue publicizes your home address and should be avoided, though Gowalla and Foursquare claim this is acceptable and provide a "home" category to do just that.

So while getting your next midnight Big Mac free might be economically pleasing, you may want to think twice before you let the public in on your every move.

# Degrassi debuts first trans character

In the world of Degrassi Community School, being a teenager can be rough, but imagine trying to navigate the world of adolescence while feeling like you've been given the wrong body.

Degrassi's newest character, Adam, encounters this as the first transgender character on the show.

Played by 15-year-old Jordan Todosey, previously seen on Life with Derek, Adam deals with being a transgender teen and normal teen issues, like just struggling to be himself, said writer Michael Grassi. Not every episode will focus on Adam being transgender. "He's just a part of the school," said Grassi, adding that Adam will be facing the same situations other characters do, like possibly some family drama and action in the love life department.

Todosey, who has always been attracted to interesting characters, did as much research as she could to prepare for the role, including watching Boys Don't Cry and YouTube videos by transgender teens. She also underwent physical changes, like cutting her hair. "That was a lot harder than I thought it'd be," she said.

To get into character, she tapes down her breasts and embraces the many layers of boy clothing. Throughout it all, her goal is about respect for the character. "I just want to keep playing Adam to the best of my ability without mocking him," she said.

She's also been pleased with feedback the character has gotten from the trans community. She often receives messages on her Twitter account from teens. "The character speaks to anyone who's an outcast."

On the Degrassi message boards, there's been an outpouring of support for the character. "People from the trans community are saying they went through the same thing," said Grassi.

The writers of Degrassi decided on approaching a trans character after reading about high schools across Canada and the United States having teens coming out sooner. Having a character like Adam shows kids "it's happening on TV now, shows those kids they're not alone," said Grassi.

It was also a great time to introduce the character with the new show format of over 40 episodes instead of 24.

As for when the show starts again this fall?

"I think the fans will have a lot to chew on once the season starts,"

# The bystander effect

Have you ever been in a situation where you saw someone who you thought might need help, but you weren't 100 per cent sure? You chose to carry on with what you were doing, figuring if they did need help, someone else would help them. Many of us have been in situations like this, whether it was kids play-fighting roughly or hearing your neighbours in a verbal fight.

This is known as the bystander effect: in most cases, the larger the group is, the less likely the person needing help will get it. The bystander effect is not only present in unsure situations – such as not knowing if some kids are playfighting or bullying – it can happen in the case of a real crime.

An example of the extreme negative effects of the bystander effect is the murder of Kitty Genovese in March of 1964. Genovese lived in an apartment complex in New York with many neighbours, and on her way into her building on March 13, she was brutally attacked and stabbed twice by her assailant. After Genovese called for help many times and drew the attention of her neighbours who were watching through their windows, the attacker fled and left her fatally injured. After 10 to 15 minutes, Genovese's attacker came back, stabbed her again repeatedly and raped her while she died. The attacks on Genovese lasted for 30

Approximately 24 of Genovese's neighbours saw the attack; only after the attacker fled the last time did someone call the police.

People tend to not approach others who may be in need because they don't want to feel silly for thinking a person needs help if they don't. Sometimes it may even seem dangerous to get involved in violent situations.

There are ways we can get around these barriers: if you're not sure whether someone needs help or not, ask them for help. For example, you see a couple having an argument, and you think it might get violent - stop and ask them for directions. Communicating with people, even about something seemingly unrelated, will give you a better feel for the situation.

If the situation is more severe, like a group attack or a fight with weapons, call the police. Does it matter if someone else has already called? Isn't it better for the police to get four or five calls than none? If you're still unsure what to do, call a friend or family member and ask them for advice. They can help you feel more confident about your decision.

In the end, it's better to feel silly for trying to do the right thing than regret you did nothing.

# Social Code making their way towards rock stardom

I write about random things a lot. I write a lot about random things. It's a funny thing — it seems with each month and year that goes by, the ways in which the Internet has affected the music industry are becoming more and more apparent.

While many changes have been obvious (like sales), many have sat quietly and gone unnoticed by the majority of the population — like the way an artist or band transitions from obscurity to their moment in the spotlight. If fame can traditionally be allotted to some proverbial 15 minutes of note, then surely with music it has become closer to a solid 90 seconds.

With the exception of a roster of legacy bands still touring and producing since their beginnings in decades past, there are almost no bands today that have come into prominence before the Internet boom.

One rare exception I've found is Alberta's Social Code, a band that got their start in 1999 as Fifth Season, formed by singer Travis Nesbitt and bassist Logan Jacobs. The year 2003 saw them change their name to Social Code, sign to Interscope Records, and begin work on their debut, *A Year At The Movies*.

Leading up to that was a lot of hard work, however, the likes of which make the boys in Social Code an authority on how to make an entrance into the world of rock stardom. The band stopped into London in August, and I got a chance to speak to Nesbitt and guitarist Morgan Gies all about it.

"When we got our first deal, record companies actually signed you to develop you," Nesbitt told me outside the London Music Hall. "So they would sign you to a single-sheet contract saying, 'We're going to develop you, and we get first right of refusal on the first record that you guys do.' So what they do is they dump a little bit of cash into you, and then they send a producer up and you start to work together, and if you come up with something good, then they'll sign you."

This practice was long ago thrown out of the window, Nesbitt went on to say — one of a number of ways in which a band's development has changed.

"It's just getting smaller and smaller," he shrugged. "So now what bands are forced to do is exactly what we did: be an independent label, go into your basement and record your own record. And develop yourselves, figure it out yourselves. So it's just different ... maybe it's better, maybe it's worse, it's just different."

"If Led Zeppelin was out now, they would never make it," said Gies. "I read somewhere it wasn't until their second or third record before [they became profitable]. If that had happened these days, they would have been dropped from their label, and that would have been it."

Ten years on, the boys admit touring has changed quite a bit, too.

"On this record, we wanted to do the right tours, so we didn't want to just go out and tour our faces off in Canada," Nesbitt began. "So for us, it's like, 'Look, if we're going to go out and tour, it better be the right tour.' That's the thing that we've figured out nowadays, is that 'no' is sometimes better than saying 'yes' to everything. It's kind of strange.

"The old us probably would've done Warped Tour for a couple of weeks and then jumped on with Theory Of A Deadman for a couple of weeks, and then flew over to the east coast and played a show with whoever, you know what I mean? It burns through money."

# D.O.A. brings their hardcore sound to London

Thirty years since their debut album, *Something Better Change*, Vancouver hardcore originators D.O.A. have been keeping things loud, fast and surprisingly original.

"You've got to come up with new ideas and keep people interested, and show that you've still got your brain working and you're not just going through the motions," said the band's frontman, political activist, writer and former Green Party candidate Joey "Shithead" Keithley, during a phone interview from his home out west. "Otherwise you become one of these revues, like when you see Crowbar and Prism and Trooper all playing, the classic rock type thing."

Keithley puts his money where his mouth is. Since 1980, the band has released 18 full-length albums (including one live album), countless 7" singles and they've contributed to several compilations. It's a huge catalogue of material to choose from, and their set list for the October 5 show at Call the Office is likely to run the gamut.

As Keithley said, "I have my favourites and that's generally what we play live. There are some songs I haven't listened to for a long time, and I put them back on and I'm like, 'Oh yeah, that's pretty good!' But I hadn't thought about that song for five, 10, 15

years.

Forgetting the songs altogether is another worry. "Some of them, I have to sit down with the record and I'm like, 'How does that go?""

Luckily, retracing his steps usually isn't hard. Defined by the minimal use of chord structure, fast beats and words that are generally more shouted than sung, D.O.A.'s music is simplistic and primal with a political edge, also reasons for the band's status as a cult favourite amongst hardcore and punk fans.

In fact, D.O.A. played a significant role in the development of west coast hardcore music, even providing the genre's namesake with their sophomore release, Hardcore '81. Alongside bands like Black Flag and Minor Threat, they helped to pioneer the angrier branch of punk rock, incorporating heavier guitars and faster drum beats. D.O.A. also maintained a firm political agenda, writing songs about police brutality and rebelling against symbols of the conservative right wing, like Ronald Reagan.

"Some come (to D.O.A's concerts) to listen to the music because they like the groove or because they like the politics or because it's a party," said Keithley of the band's fans. "If you can get up there and inspire people and go as hard at it as you can, you get that back from the crowd and it's a thrill."

But for all its brashness, lack of poetics and beer-stained dance floors, hardcore punk rock like D.O.A. has more recently taken a turn toward the intellectual. A few years ago, Simon Fraser University in Vancouver, B.C. began a catalogue of old Canadian punk memorabilia, and with punk-turned-professors like Bad Religion's Greg Graffin, Keithley has come to see North America embrace punk's grittiness as more than a passing fad.

"Whether people realize it or not, within a small percentage of people involved, there was always an intellectual edge to (punk rock) and there were people who thought all this stuff through quite a bit, instead of coming from a reactive type background or acting that way (in response) to what society was doing. I think with punk rock, because it's an extraordinary fit of anti-establishment anarchy and that it was different than a lot of types of music, that's why ... it's getting its due."

With his newfound respectability, Keithley leapt into politics in 1996, running as a Green Party candidate in British Columbia's provincial elections. But after two long campaigns, he resigned to spend the greater part of his time working for Sudden Death Records (Keithley's own creation) and writing, playing and touring with D.O.A.





The seemingly reformed Gekko offers advice to Jake about the truth of Wall Street and the hidden agendas of his fellow traders. Aside from Gekko's tale, Money Never Sleeps focuses on relationships: Jake and his mentors, his mother, his fiancée

and his idolatry towards Gekko himself.

More than just a fictitious melodrama, Money Never Sleeps chronicles the financial crisis of 2008. Scenes of pure chaos on the floor of the New York Stock Exchange give insight into the scale of panic felt by traders during the recordbreaking days of financial loss on the markets. Compounding this effect on the viewer is the sub-plot of Louis Zabel, a big time player in the markets, whose story is the epitome of the chilling consequences of the cutthroat world of Wall Street.

Much of Money Never Sleeps' strength comes from the cast. Michael Douglas reprises his role as Gordon Gekko and plays him in such a way that no one can ever truly be sure of what his intentions are. It is this moral ambiguity that makes Gekko a character that is enjoyable to watch repeatedly. Shia LaBeouf joins Douglas as Jake Moore. LaBeouf creates within Jake an evolution of character from bright-eyed, bushy-tailed trader with integrity, to a deceitful man whose bottom line is money. LaBeouf's counterpart is Carev Mulligan as the liberal, down-toearth Winnie Gekko, the polar opposite from her father. Frank Langella plays the tragic Louis Zabel, and his adversary Bretton James is played villainously by the versatile Josh Brolin. The cast is rounded out by Susan Saradon as Jake's mother, and an unsurprising but thoroughly entertaining appearance by Charlie Sheen as Bud Fox.

By all accounts, Wall Street: Money Never Sleeps is a successful successor to the 1987 original, and while it has some strong romantic melodrama overtones, and a few awkwardly placed sight gags, it is both entertaining and enlightening from beginning to end.

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# Comeback Kid typical screamo

What's standard of hardcore music, or "screamo" as most underground music enthusiasts will tell you, is the loudness, the passion, and the intensity that musicians put forth in a live concert or during a production recording. Listeners are guaranteed a venting session to headbang, fist pump and yell, but unfortunately, to tune into the poetry of the lyrics is non-negotiable. Hardcore music is a difficult genre to critique, and unless you really love the scene, the overpowering noise of the guitar, bass, drums or vocals makes it hard to get to hear the lyrics while you are sitting down relaxing with a bottle of beer.

That's not to say their lyrics aren't good: on the fourth song Because of All, Comeback Kid poignantly state while thinking about what he should have said to a girl, "...give it some time. Mulling it over / Pulling down the shades until the nerves recover / You wanna know what's really bothering me? / I'm not passive aggressive, but I had to leave." What's good to note is that Comeback Kid wrote their own lyrics and worked with engineer/producer, Eric Ratz (known for works with Billy Talent and Cancer Bats), so there was a clear direction of a sound to familiarize themselves.

Symptoms + Cures is the title of the Winnipeg-born band's latest album. The band was formed in 2002 by Andrew Neufeld (vocals) and Jeremy Hiebert (guitarist), who were both members of the band Figure Four (currently on break). They were joined by Kyle Profetta (drums), Casey Hjelmber (guitar) and Mathew Keil (bass). Their initial popularity was mainly due to word of mouth in the hardcore scene. This sixth album happens to acknowledge former Pittsburgh Penguins NHL hockey player Mario Lemieux, returning to the ice. But unfortunately, Comeback Kid slides into the grey genre of

What would have been ideal for Comeback Kid would be a wider range of music on their CD. Many hardcore bands slide towards slower melodies (think now defunct 2003 hardcore band Glassjaw or present day System of a Down), with softer riffs and more harmony. Screaming is great for a few songs, but if the whole album is intense, hard and powerful, it gets dull by the end and lumps itself with all other hardcore bands.

# Training your back muscles

When it comes to weight training for specific body parts, many will agree that training their backs is the most challenging. Weight training legs is often challenging considering the amount of energy we expend on heavy leg presses and squats. However, our giant back muscles provide an entirely different obstacle in terms of achieving desired results. Let's discuss some of the common issues and possible tips to get the best out of your back days.

What's so difficult about training my back muscles?

First off, we are all different in the way we respond to particular workouts. Some people have no issues with certain movements and workouts, while others struggle to achieve similar results even though they are doing the exact same thing. Training your back generally involves pulling motions such as rowing exercises. The main issue most people face is that their biceps, forearms or both tire out before their backs even begin to feel the workout!

That is exactly what happens to me! Why is this?

These exercises involve both the biceps and large back muscles. Since our biceps muscles are much smaller than our back muscles, it's inevitable that they produce less force and fatigue much quicker! These muscle groups work in a chain-like fashion and any chain is only as strong as its weakest link.



When it comes to building muscles, one area that most find challenging is the back.

So how do I fix this problem?

The first thing anyone needs to do is find a suitable weight for each of their back workouts. One of the biggest errors people make is using far too much weight for their sets. If the weight you are using is too heavy, your biceps will fatigue extremely fast and you can forget about your back. Find a weight that allows your back to be making the movements for you as opposed to your biceps struggling to pull the weight. Really focus on activating your back muscles throughout the entire range of motion. Another tip that helps for certain back exercises, such as rows and pull-ups, is the following: use a grip in which your thumbs are not wrapped around the bar/handles but rather rested beside your index fingers (call it an overfinger grip if you will). This helps

your arms and biceps to act more like anchors and forces your back muscles to do more of the work.

Are there any particular exercises I can do?

One of the best things to ensure you really target your back is trying out some pre-exhaustion exercises. This involves doing an isolation exercise such as pull-overs and going right into a compound exercise such as pull-downs without any rest between each exercise. This causes a pre-exhaustion of your back muscles and ensures that your back muscles fatigue before your biceps do when you perform the pull-downs. It is somewhat difficult to explain in a brief article, but feel free to stop by the gym for a visual explanation. In the meantime, get BACK to work.

# Former Falcon suspended for drug use at championships

Random drug tests are a normal part of athletics, from professional leagues to school sports.

That's why so many people are surprised that Brandon Cato, a former forward for the Falcons men's basketball team, was caught with cannabis in his system during a random drug test at the Canadian Colleges Athletic Association championships earlier this year.

Cannabinoids are classified as "specified substances" on the World Anti-Doping Agency Prohibited List, and are banned in competition. Under the rules of the Canadian Centre for Ethics in Sport's anti-doping program, punishments for a first violation involving a specified substance can range from a reprimand to a two-year suspension from the

Cato received a one-month suspension after testing positive at the championships in Calgary on March 20. His suspension runs from September 1 to 30. Cato was unavailable for comment.

This is Fanshawe's first doping offence.

Student-athletes are well educated in the national and provincial rules and regulations regarding drug use, according to Eric Collins, athletic program officer at Fanshawe. "We have a very intense education program, seminars, pamphlets, training through both the Canadian Colleges Athletic Association and the Ontario Colleges Athletic Association.

"(Athletes) are tested all through the year," he said. "This is also part of the education process for these student athletes and the coaches themselves. They can be tested at any time. They can be tested at home, during practice, at tournaments, at championships - there really is no limitation as to when a test can occur."

Since Cato is no longer enrolled at Fanshawe, the school is not able to punish him under the school's code of conduct. However, "as a student at that particular time, we still look at it as a code of conduct issue," said Bob Clark, one of Fanshawe's campus security supervisors.

Clark explained that if Cato were to return to Fanshawe as a student, he would be subject to Fanshawe's regulations regarding drug use. "In most cases, it's a security officer that deals with (drug offences). They'd give him a violation notice, which is a minor offence under the student code of conduct."

Clark said the terms and length of a punishment for a drug offence depend on the type and amount of drug the student is caught with. "It's like the court system here in Canada: depending on what you have in your possession, it depends on the severity how the courts look at it."

"It's very disappointing, especially given the education programs that we have in place," said Collins. "A priority is given at this college to clean, fair play.

"I think although most people within the sporting community will see this as a relatively minor infraction and a relatively minor suspension, this is something as a department we are taking seriously. We're going to ramp up our already intense education programs for all of our student athletes, our staff and our coaches."

Joe Scalia, president of the Fanshawe Student Union, said the situation was unfortunate. "When you are an athlete, you are subject to the CCAA guidelines and as a representative for the college, you're subject to the expectations put forth by the college."

Athletic director Mike Lindsay was unavailable for comment.

# Tesla provides a jolt

Many of you may not have heard of Tesla, but trust me, this company will become a household name.

Elon Musk, creator of PayPal, started the company. Though Musk can afford just about any car on the planet, he wanted to own a car company that produces only zero-emission vehicles.

The company started operations in 2003 and started showing prototypes by 2005. Over the next few years, much research and development was done and a global dealer network was set up. Now, Tesla has dealers in over 25 countries.

Their dealership in Toronto started doing business late last year, and the first customer cars started trickling out earlier this year. So far, just over 30 cars have been delivered in Canada not bad for a new car company that still doesn't have a proper showroom, and the base model has a price of \$125,000.

So it's not cheap to get into a full-sized electric car, but is it worth it?

To find out, I asked the Tesla staff to book me into a car for a day. They booked me into their latest model the Roadster Sport 2.5, and like the original Roadster model, this one also is based off the Lotus Elise. While almost all body panels are different, you cannot hide this car's roots by giving it new clothes.

The Elise platform has its plus and minuses. On the plus side, it is a very rigid, lightweight and compact platform, certainly the best chassis in the business to use for a sports car. On the minus side, you get high door sills which makes getting in and out a bit of a challenge, especially if the roof is on.

As you climb into the minimal adjustable seats, you will find the steering wheel is not adjustable. In short: you either fit in this car, or you don't.

It is strange at first when you start this car, because there is no whirring from the starter motor or any exhaust sound. You simply press "D" on the centre console (it has a push-button gear selector) and start driving.

I noticed that the non-powerassisted steering is quite heavy at slow speeds, so it's not ideal for making a three-point turn in. Thankfully, the steering weight

eases up at driving speed, and boy, does this thing ever get up to speed. This has to be one of the quickest cars I have ever driven. Since it has an electric motor, it doesn't have to wait to build up torque; the moment you press the throttle, the car takes off. Since it also has a single speed gearbox, it doesn't have to choose the right gear for the speed for acceleration, either. This car is always ready to slingshot you forward.

Its motivation comes from a 375 volt AC induction air-cooled electric motor, which produces 288 hp and 295 lb/ft of torque. With a curb weight of just 2,723 lbs, you get a car that can accelerate from 0-100 km/h in 3.9 seconds with a limited top speed of 200 km/h.

Since the Tesla is based on the Lotus chassis, this car is nimble and very predictable. While at the track it won't handle like an Elise due to its extra weight, on the road you won't feel it lacking. In fact, thanks to its revised damper settings, the Tesla has a better ride than its Lotus cousin.

The Tesla is an entertaining car to drive, but it is not without faults. First, you need space near an electrical outlet when you park it, because you will need to charge it. This can take up to eight hours. Tesla claims you can go nearly 394 km on a full charge, though in reality a range of 300 km can be expected. The second downside is that you will need to have another car, because of our winters. Of course, playthings are never supposed to be practical. Plus, if you can afford a Tesla, you can probably afford to have another car.

The biggest downside is the price for two reasons. First, my test car with all available options picked, stickered at \$175,000. That is a lot of money for a car with few creature comforts. Second, the Lotus Elise starts at \$60,000. You can buy a lot of gas with the money you saved, but that would be missing the point.

The Tesla is expensive because it is the first all-electric car. A lot of money has been spent developing this car, and since this is not a mass-produced vehicle, the per-unit cost is high.

Am I convinced? Absolutely. If I could afford a Tesla, I would buy one. While I would miss the exhaust music produced by exotic sports cars, I could get used to the unique whirring sound of the electric motor as you speed

The Tesla is not for everybody, but if you want a full-size electric toy car, and can afford it, then you should certainly get yourself one. You can thank me


#### The Rundown
